SHREWSBURY UNITARIANS LEARN HOW TO LISTEN

On Saturday 9th June, nine of the congregation gathered for a few hours of training about listening skills under the guidance of one of their local Samaritan trainers – Sue. Here is a report by Shrewsbury Unitarians' Chair, Debra Burbery – other congregations may like to consider asking their local Samaritan branch to do something similar.

“We started off with an exercise which involved following verbal instructions to draw an animal without, and then with, the chance to ask simple questions. The resulting pictures we all came up with were very ‘interesting’ interpretations / weird creatures indeed – especially the ones where no questions could be asked! This showed us how simple but careful questioning can elucidate a ‘clearer picture’. We discussed and explored what the barriers and distractions were to our own understanding when talking or having a deep conversation with someone. The ‘Listening Wheel’ concept was introduced, and the various stages explained in a little more detail.

Then came the fun of roleplaying! In groups of three, we each had a go at playing a role, either as the talker in a scenario, a listener/questioner and an observer. The observer noted how the listener used the various stages of the listening wheel. We fed back / talked about how the listening time went and the group came together to find out what we had all learned from the different roles and exercises.

We went away from the morning’s activities having learned much more about how we can improve ourselves as listeners in our everyday lives – a very worthwhile exercise for all concerned.”
